A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CHINESE AMERICAN MEDICAL SOCIETY

The Chinese American Medical Society was formed in New York City, in 1964, the result of the union of alumni associations of medical colleges in Shanghai, Peking, and several other cities, which had been meeting here for a number of years. The new organization had the objectives of advancing medical knowledge and scientific research and establishing scholarships for students and endowments for medical schools and hospitals.

Originally numbering some 70 members, the organization had over 400 members by 1986. It attracted members through its biannual meetings, held in early summer and late fall; a quarterly Bulletin that included the latest medical papers published by members; a comprehensive membership Directory; an annual Scientific Award for notable medical/scientific research; and, not the least, for the camaraderie it offered to classmates, schoolmates, and colleagues. In those early years, spouses and children all helped in putting together the biannual meetings.

Scholarships for medical students started in 1973, with 4 awards a year. By 2001, over 130 scholarships had been awarded. The amount of the awards, \$1,000 each, has not changed. In the 1970s, the scholarship fund was considerably larger than the annual operating budget of the society. The awardees have gone on to become active practitioners as well as faculty members at well-known medical centers.

Also in the 1970s, the society started establishing chapters in several cities. The first was the Capital District Chapter in Albany, followed by the Greater Boston Chapter. In the late 1980s, the Mid-Atlantic Chapter came into being. Each Chapter elects its own officers, holds its own meetings, and sends representatives to the meetings in New York. The Chapters bring a wider perspective to the meetings, and a couple of annual meetings have been held at Chapter sites.

A name change was adopted in 1985. Initially, the organization was called the American Chinese Medical Society; the new name, Chinese American Medical Society, or CAMS, emphasizes the American aspect and reflects the fact that more and more of the new members and officers were US medical graduates.

At the same time that CAMS was growing and attracting new members through its program of excellent continuing medical education meetings, with topics centered around diseases common among Chinese Americans, a similar movement coalesced on the West Coast. There, physicians at the Chinese Hospital in San Francisco and several other groups put together biennial meetings, starting in 1981, with similar intent and programs. These meetings were titled International Conference on Health Problems Related to the Chinese in North America, and they usually extended over a 3-day weekend. Recognizing our common interests, the leadership of CAMS joined forces with the West Coast group and proceeded to host the Third (1986), the Seventh (1994), and the upcoming Eleventh (2002) International Conference. These meetings have attracted considerable attention and brought increased awareness of the issues.

A natural outcome of this collaboration has been the formation of a Federation of medical societies from the USA and Canada, to formalize our shared interest in promulgating research, practice, and improved access to health care on the part of the Chinese in North America. At this time, there are 7 US societies and 2 Canadian societies in the Federation.

Another aspect of the development of CAMS, starting in the 1970s, has been its support of the Chinatown Health Clinic. This clinic was founded in 1971 as a free clinic serving the many new immigrants arriving in New York as a result of the immigration law changes of 1965. This support has grown stronger and is now a mutually re-enforcing relationship with emphasis on clinical practice and epidemiological research.

In the late 1980s, as managed health care started to spread into the metropolitan area, some members had the foresight to recognize this as the wave of things to come. Thus the Society fostered participation in managed care groups, to the advantage of both patients and providers. In 1997, the Chinese American Independent Practice Association (CAIPA) was formed, which today numbers more than 200 members. CAIPA donated funds to initiate a CAMS/CAIPA Community Service Fund in the year 2000. Earlier this year, two grants devoted to health care of the Chinese community were awarded by this fund.

Looking back over the 38 years of its existence, CAMS has changed and yet remained the same. The main change has been the gradual increase in US medical graduates, although significant numbers of new members are from China, Taiwan, and elsewhere in the Far East. Despite this change and its cultural implications, the underlying concern is still about medical care, education, and research among the Chinese.

The Society now has over 850 members, including 250 in the Chapters, and over 60 medical students. Mention must be made of a few people among the many who were critical to its growth and success. This short list includes Dr. Percy Tung, a founding member who worked for several years to organize the society and obtain tax exempt status for it; the late Dr. S. J. Yue, a founder and first President, who led the infant society through its first decade; Dr. Wang Hsueh Hwa, Treasurer, President, and then Executive Director since 1986, whose energy and ability have made CAMS what it is today; and Dr. David Chiu, whose 15 years of active leadership led to the formation of the Federation. Finally, we must recognize the many physicians who served as officers or on the Board of Directors, who gave generously of their time, effort, and counsel and who made CAMS an enduring and notable organization.

Dr. Li, Chairman of Pathology at Long Island College Hospital, Brooklyn, NY is past-President of CAMS (1992-93).




