

Conference History

This Conference was founded in 1982 by the Chinese Hospital Medical Staff of San Francisco. The conference brought together a number of Chinese American and Chinese Canadian medical societies, as well as many North American and international physicians interested in health problems of the Chinese in North America. During this time, the Federation of Chinese American and Chinese Canadian Medical Societies (FCMS) was established to oversee the continuing development of the Conference on a biennial basis.

Conference Goals & Objectives

- 1. To congregate physicians and scholars to discuss common and related health problems of the Chinese in North America
- 2. To establish a database of the incidence of disease patterns among Chinese North Americans
- 3. To establish comparative data on Chinese North American health problems related to cultural assimilation
- 4. To encourage clinical and/or basic research in health problems affecting Chinese North Americans
- 5. To publish proceedings of the Conference as a means of expanding access to resources on these health problems

I had started my practice in internal medicine and cardiology in San Francisco's Chinatown in 1971. It did not take long for me to build a catalogue of problems and opportunities that arose from trying to practice my training in our transplanted culture. As I attended meetings in various cities, it became obvious to me that



health providers working in similar settings across the continent had much to share. I suggested the idea of this Conference in 1980 to Chinese Hospital's Chief of Staff, Edward A. Chow, MD. His successor was Russell D. Woo, MD. Both were extremely supportive, and appointed me as the first Scientific Program Chair while Dr. Chow took on the job of General Conference Chair. We worked for two years to sharpen our focus and to stir up interest among our friends in other Chinese communities. We waded through a number of practical problems attached to any conference but did it as first-timers with limited experience. It was fun and exciting! We even asked members of the Medical Staff to pledge personal funds to guarantee the financial security of that first conference. Nineteen volunteers came forward. Thankfully, that caution proved unneeded.

Finally, the big day came on May 22, 1982. One hundred eighty participants appeared, including many who still take an active role in the Conference today. We enjoyed a program so stimulating that our colleagues in Los Angeles embraced sponsorship of the Second Conference in 1984. For over a decade, the Medical Staff at Chinese Hospital continued to shepherd the Conference as it spawned first the Asian American Health Forum and then the Federation of Chinese American and Chinese Canadian Medical Societies. The Federation took over ownership beginning with the Eighth Conference held in Vancouver in 1996.

Many enriching experiences and friendships have arisen from these meetings, not to mention the updating of knowledge germane to our daily work. This Conference is truly unique, forging a bond among a corps of special professionals, themselves dedicated to a wonderfully special constituency. Those who have worked up front and behind the scenes to make these meetings so successful deserve our deepest appreciation. It is my fervent hope not only that the Conference will continue to grown in numbers, stature, and enthusiasm, but that each of you will expand your own activity, especially in recruiting new enthusiasts. Tell your friends about us! Bring someone new with you! Help us grow!

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Some Reflections on the International Conference on Health Problems Related to the Chinese in North America

Several events gave impetus to the prior development of the first International Conference on Health Problems Related to the Chinese in North America. The beginnings were at an era of active responses to anti-discrimination of minorities. The



United States Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) began their documentation of the perceived gap in all phases of health care. HHS recognized some of the discrepancies and sought more data. The Chinese Hospital Medical Staff in San Francisco was requested to assist the HHS in their study, as one of many suitable organizations across the nation.

New community health organizations came into existence, to bridge the known gap in health. The governing body and Medical Staff of the only Chinese Hospital in the United States added their support to these new community organizations. An educational approach was felt to be most appropriate by the Chinese Hospital for the Community.

As a fact finding and education forum, the Chinese Hospital Medical Staff, through its education committee had accepted the production of the initial "Health Problems Related to the Chinese in North America." The staff was aware of the barriers and the gap in health care, particularly with ethnic Chinese Americans, which included a large influx of immigrants and refugees. This first major conference was the joint affair, with the Chinese Hospital Medical Staff in San Francisco, Chinese American Physician Society in Oakland, Chinese Physicians of Chinatown in Los Angeles, and Chinese Physicians Society of Southern California.

On the East Coast, the medical organizations, most notably, Chinese American Medical Society of New York, with neighborhood health clinics were similarly addressing health issues as the West Coast. Mutual support between East and West Coast followed without noteworthy problems.

The mutual assistance of the societies in the formation of the conferences led to a fall-out with the formation of the Federation of Chinese American and Chinese Canadian Medical Societies (FCMS). The New York group and the San Francisco area representatives held joint meetings concerning a national Chinese American physician society. Toronto and Vancouver groups joined in subsequently. The getting together; holding discussions whenever it was feasible; debating over the kind of physician organization and the implications; the vision, defined mission and objective; dues structures, and other financial support; the state in which to incorporate; and even the logo, took considerable time, much constraints and efforts. One can imagine that success was not always in clear sight, given the free flow of thoughts of physicians and their actual or perceived expertise. Each step is another story.

It took several years. The basic concepts and reasons held, and we are now the Federation of Chinese American and Chinese Canadian Medical Societies, with two new organizations added, Association of Chinese Canadian Professionals in Vancouver, British Columbia and Philippine Chinese American Medical Association in Scarsdale, New York. We are incorporated in California. As a consequence of developing the International Conference on Health Problems Related to the Chinese in North America, and after a number of years in discussion, the Conference was assigned to FCMS by the Chinese Hospital Medical Staff, and has become an important function of the FCMS. The FCMS is now on a new threshold, and staying the course.

I have been privileged and honored of being with the FCMS, initially on the Steering Committee as Chair, and then the first Chairman of the Board of FCMS.

From The First Conference Chair



The concept for a conference on health issues related to care of the Chinese in America was raised during my term as Chief of Staff during the building of the new Chinese Hospital. The completion of the new hospital could be an opportunity to bring together those who were serving Chinese throughout North America to celebrate, and share their experiences. The new building was completed in 1979. In 1980, the new Chief of Staff, Dr. Russell Woo, and the medical staff agreed to sponsor such a conference. As Chairman of Continuing Education, I was appointed as Conference Chair. We needed to get financial backing, educational credits, and a sound program.

The conference committee spent the next two years identifying the goals of the conference which were later to become the goals of future conferences, including the sharing of knowledge and fostering of research on health problems of the Chinese in America. The University of California San Francisco also agreed to co-sponsor the inaugural program, and grant CME credit. I was pleased that Dr. Collin P. Quock volunteered to serve as

Chair of the Scientific Program. This would assure scholarship and quality. He was instrumental in setting up a program which would also address the issues of eastern medical care, including Chinese herbs and acupuncture along with a broad range of topics reflecting the many aspects of care for the Chinese. A number of medical staff members also agreed to "guarantee" the conference, so that it would be fiscally sound. The participants all volunteered their time. San Francisco Foundation generously sponsored the Proceedings.

It has been twenty years since the first conference. Out of the conference programs has grown the Federation of Chinese American and Chinese Canadian Societies (FCMS). The conference was also the opportunity for rooting the Asian American Health Forum which would become the Asian and Pacific Islander American Health Forum (APIAHF). APIAHF has been at the forefront carrying the message of Asian health needs on the federal and regional level. The FCMS now has responsibility for the conference, and is developing a foundation for continued service to the community.

It is fashionable today to discuss the disparities in the different ethnic populations in America. Twenty years ago, I was privileged to Chair the first conference in North America to address this issue for the Chinese minority. In the next twenty years, the role of the Conference will surely change, but I hope it will remain an opportunity to share experiences and focus attention on the changing needs of our Chinese community.

The Inception of FCMS

During the concluding moments and gaiety of the well-orchestrated Fifth Conference in Toronto in 1990, after a high spirited bidding for the privilege to host the 1994 Conference was determined by a slim margin in favor of New York, I rose to thank the members of the Conference Committee for the honor and to acknowledge the gallantry of the Vancouver delegates. Moved by the comradery that was permeating and energized by the enthusiasm that was sizzling, I divulged a desire to see all the physicians of Chinese in North America unite and crystallize into a cohesive group that will devote its resources to research that are pertinent and unique to the Chinese living on this continent, and to promote investigations that may help to decode the metaphors of Chinese medicine. The vision is to build a critical mass of physicians of Chinese descent to make our voices heard, our interests count, to build a foundation upon which our posterity can



raise a monumental tower bathing in the golden glory of our cultural heritage, in the field of medicine in North America. I proposed that we shall form a federation.

The response was overwhelming. Following a feverish deliberation, I was given the responsibility to convene and Chair an Exploratory Committee to form this federation. I sought and was blessed with the guidance and partnership of Dr. Harry Lee, inspiring dedication of Dr. John Chiu, Dr. Hseuh-hwa Wang, Dr. John Li, Dr. Sun Hoo Foo, Dr. Ed Chow, and many others. In the ensuring four years this committee met in countless places, in all imaginable forms. We brainstormed, we debated, we philosophized, we compromised. With unyielding dedication, unparalleled mutual respect and comradery we clarified our vision, defined our mission, formalized the organizational architecture, drafted the Constitution and Bylaws, constructed the financial framework, set the fee structure, picked the name, and finally designed the logo. The concept, the name "Federation of Chinese American and Chinese Canadian Medical Societies" (FCMS), the organizational blueprint, the Constitution and Bylaws, and the logo were presented to and ratified by all seven constituent member organizations. As a finishing touch, the Chinese Hospital Medical Staff as the originator of the Biennial Conference which provided the birthplace of the federation, voted to transfer the duty of conducting the Biennial Conference to FCMS.

the FCMS is born ...

On July 1, 1994 during a magnificent gathering at the Sheraton Conference Center in New York City, FCMS was inaugurated. As Chairman of the Organizing Committee of the Federation, I had the privilege of recognizing the respective Presidents of each constituent Society, introducing the Chairman of the FCMS Board of Directors Dr. Harry Lee, and each of the members of the Board. As the FCMS was born I was assigned the duty to serve as its President.

It has been eight years since the inception of FCMS. The eight growing years have tested the will and resolve of this organization, and witnessed the flame of its ideal continue to rise and glow in the wind.

Reflections of FCMS Historian

In 1981, when the Chinese Hospital in San Francisco was organizing the very First International Conference on Health Problems Related to the Chinese in North America, Dr. John Chiu, then the President of the Federation of Chinese Canadian Professionals (Ontario) as well as the President of the Chinese Canadian Medical Society (Ontario), responded to the call to endorse as well as participate at the Conference, held in San Francisco in 1982. With that, started Dr. Chiu's 20 years of involvement with the vision and goal of bringing the Chinese American and Chinese Canadian medical and health organizations together to improve the status of health of the Chinese. Since then Dr. Chiu had been with the National Steering Committee from the beginning, and attended all the 10 biennial conferences. In 1990, he also chaired the 5th Conference held in Toronto. Dr. John Chiu has served as Vice-President of FCMS in 1994-96, President in 1996-98, and as the Chairman of the Board in 1998-2000, as well as the Historian of the FCMS from its inception until now.

The FCMS is a unique organization which brings together all the major medical societies with members of Chinese ethnic origin in United States and in Canada. The common goal is to enhance the health care delivery to the Chinese living in North America through education, information exchange, data analysis and research. The formation of this organization has taken years of ideas and efforts of many dedicated people who have worked together in the common arena of biennial North American Conferences on Health Problems related to the Chinese. FCMS is still in in its infant stage, and will need the support and encouragement from all of you to ensure its further development on its worthwhile endeavors.

Chronology of events:

1981

The idea of having a Conference on Health Problems of the Chinese in North America started with the Chinese Hospital in San Francisco.

1982

First Conference: On May 22, 1982, over 200 doctors gathered in San Francisco to discuss the health problems related to the Chinese in North America. It was the first Conference of its kind, hosted by the Chinese Hospital Medical Staff.

Following the conference a Steering Committee, composing of representatives from seven North American Chinese medical organizations, was officially formed to continue setting guidelines and policies for future conferences. The *National Steering Committee* was formed with participation of the Chinese Hospital of San Francisco, the Chinese American Physicians Society of East Bay, Oakland, the Chinese Physicians Society of Southern California of Los Angeles, the Chinese Canadian Medical Society of Ontario (Toronto), the Association of Chinese Community Physicians of San Francisco, and American Center for Chinese Medical Sciences of Virginia, and the Chinese American Medical Society of New Jersey. Its Founding Chairman was Dr. Edward Chow of San Francisco.

1984

2nd Conference on August 18-19 in Los Angeles, hosted by the Chinese Physicians Society of Southern California.

1986

3rd Conference on August 23-24 in New York City, hosted by the Chinese American Medical Society. New Chairman of Steering Committee was Dr. Harry Lee.

1988

4th Conference on April 22-23 in San Francisco, hosted by the Chinese Hospital Medical Staff of San Francisco.

New members were added to the Steering Committee: Chinese Physicians of Chinatown of Los Angeles, the Chinese Canadian Medical Society of Quebec (Montreal), and the Chinese Canadian Medical Society of British Columbia (Vancouver).

1990

5th Conference on June 23-24 in Toronto, hosted by the Chinese Canadian Medical Society (Ontario).

North American Steering Committee to organize the Federation of Chinese American and Chinese Canadian Medical Societies, to be set up and chaired by Dr. David Chiu.

1991

the Ad Hoc North American Steering Committee for the FCMS met in New York City on November 10. Members consisted of Dr. David Chiu (NY), Dr. Hsueh-hwa Wang (NY), Dr. John Li (NY), Dr. Harry Lee (SF), and Dr. John Chiu (Tor). Preliminary Constitution & Bylaws were drawn up.

1992

6th Conference on Jun 18-21 in San Francisco, hosted by the Chinese Hospital Medical Staff.

Additional new member joining the National Steering Committee: Chinese Community Health Care Association. Dr. Harry Lee was appointed as chair of the Ad Hoc Committee on the formation of the FCMS.

1993

The Ad Hoc Committee met in NYC on July 31, and approved the final version of the FCMS Constitution & Bylaws.

1994

The Federation of Chinese American and Chinese Canadian Medical Societies (FCMS) was formally incorporated on June 13, 1994 in the State of California.

7th Conference on July 1-3 in New York City. Inauguration of the FCMS was held on July 2nd.

Chairman of the Board: Dr. Harry Lee; President: Dr. David Chiu.

1995

FCMS Board meeting on August 25 in Vancouver. Started to take over the functions of the National Steering Committee in handling the biennial conferences. By-laws revisited. Mission statement revisited.

1996

8th Conference on August 22-25 in Vancouver, hosted by the Chinese Canadian Medical Society (BC). FCMS new Chairman: Dr. David Chiu; new President: Dr. John Chiu; Volunteer Executive Director: Dr. Harry Lee.

1997

FCMS Board Retreat on February 28- March 2 in Palm Springs: Vision of the future. FCMS Logo adopted. FCMS Board meeting on August 8-10 in Montreal: organizational issues.

1998

FCMS Board meeting on January 17-18 in San Francisco: started to produce educational pamphlets.

9th Conference on August 20-23 in Los Angeles, hosted by the Chinese American Medical Association of Southern California. FCMS Board meeting on August 20: to develop website, and to consider developing research projects. New Board Chairman: Dr. John Chiu; new President: Dr. Collin Quock; Associate Executive Director: Patricia Chung.

1999

FCMS Board meeting on February 20 in San Francisco: to start on the Advisory Council project.

Inauguration of the FCMS Advisory Council on June 27 in Los Angeles. Coordinator of Advisory Council: Dr. David Chiu; Chairman of FCMS Advisory Council: Mr. David Tseng. FCMS Board meeting on November 20 in New York City: to produce FCMS brochure and newsletter.

2000

FCMS Board meeting on March 10 in Vancouver, in conjunction with the Inauguration of the Association of Chinese Canadian Professionals (BC), or ACCP. Additional new members of FCMS are Association of Chinese Canadian Professionals (BC), and Philippine Chinese American Medical Association of New York.

10th Conference on June 30-July 1 in San Francisco, hosted by the Chinese Hospital Medical Staff of San Francisco. FCMS Board meeting on June 29. New Board Chairman: Dr. Collin Quock; new President: Dr. Hsueh-hwa Wang.

2001

FCMS Board Retreat was held in February in Los Angeles: to establish a FCMS Foundation; Generous donation from CAMS for Anniversary Booklet; revised FCMS Mission Statement. FCMS Board meeting on October 6 in Toronto, in conjunction with a one-day medical seminar organized by the Chinese Canadian Medical Society (Ont).

2002

11th Conference on May 25-26, 2002 in New York City, hosted by the Chinese American Medical Society. Celebration of 20th Anniversary of the biennial conference.

Concluding Summary Edward A. Chow, MD

Conference Chairman (May 23, 1982)

When the idea for this conference was conceived over three years ago, it was a dream during the time and the tribulations of those here in San Francisco who were trying to preserve the Chinese Hospital for this community. That crisis brought a new awareness to many of us who had not realized the importance of this facility to the health care of Chinatown. We became even more aware that in fact, not only was this facility unique, but in many respects, including customs and culture, our patient population was also unique. Many of the usual accepted Western customs were not so well accepted by our patients. We were often impacted by the mixture of Western and Eastern medicine: was this herb okay to take with that antibiotic? We were made a aware that health problems were also increasing as the already crowded conditions of our community became even more crowded. Again, this was not an isolated phenomenon as more immigrants arrived from China and Asia, and as more Chinese spread throughout all parts of the North American continent, with the Chinese population increasing rapidly in cities such as Los Angeles, Monterey Park, New York, Vancouver, Toronto, Chicago.

A number of years ago, while I was going to school just a few short blocks from this hotel, and this hotel was the famous, or infamous, Hall of Justice you might remember from the old TV series, "the Streets of San Francisco", there was great concern that the population of 25,000 Chinese was spreading out of the city, and that Chinatown would become a mere skeleton of itself. Today, as Dr. Rice has just shown us, we can now at least be counted!

With this growth, of course, have come new problems. These include the need to understand diseases which were not often seen in the Occidental population (eg. nasopharygeal carcinoma), and to recall previously common diseases in the U.S., such as parasites or tuberculosis, seldom seen except among these recent immigrants. I still recall a recent audio-digest tape on which a professor of medicine states that tuberculosis no longer need to be considered seriously, except perhaps in Pittsburgh. Cultural differences also require understanding as does ignorance toward to the acceptance of Western medicine. As health professionals- doctors, nurses, social service people- we all need to know and learn so much more in order to understand our people and to be able to answer to their fears in order to help them achieve good health.

To a great extent our Chinese population has been integrated into the mainstream of medicine. Yet, as Dr. Russell Woo, our Chief of Staff, has stated in his message to us, it is important that we mix our knowledge with the culture of the people in order to achieve optimum results.

We started this venture as a beginning which we hope will lead to further such meetings with our colleagues. We look forward to being able to continue to share our knowledge with our fellow professionals, to be able to develop sufficiently valid pools of data to advance the science, and to be able to exchange ideas among our colleagues. We hope that this will lead to improved patient care. Many issues have not been addressed today. More questions have been raised than have been answered. This is as it should be. We do not have all the answers. Those are for the future to give us.

Your participation today has been an inspiration to all of us who had hoped that one day a beginning such as this could happen. I hope that this dialogue can continue, and that one day we will have the answers.

Conference Chairman (August 19, 1984)

Two hundred medical professionals were registered at the conference. They came from different parts of the world and gathered together to share their knowledge of health problems related to the Chinese in America and also to exchange ideas to improve the quality of care for our fellow Chinese patients in America.

With the limited time we had in one and half days, we learned that nasopharyngeal carcinoma is one of the most common malignancies in the Southern Chinese related to the ingestion of Cantonese-style salted fish. America-born second generation Chinese still maintain the risk of developing this tumor. Esophageal cancer is endemic in the Northern part of China in contrast to nasopharyngeal carcinoma in the South. We must keep in mind that the incidence of hepatocellular carcinoma, colon and rectal cancer among Chinese are higher than the Caucasian. We also learned that there is a high number of depressed Chinese and they respond clinically to a smaller dose of antidepressants than Caucasian patients. Anesthesiologists should be aware that Chinese might respond to anesthetics with a sensitivity greater than the Caucasian patients; the problems of adverse reactions of anesthetics can be prevented and managed. Besides the higher resistant strain of M. Tuberculosis to INH in the Chinese population, we now found that parasitic diseases are very commonly seen in the Chinese immigrants. In addition to the higher incidence of hypokalemic periodic paralysis in our Chinese hyperthyroid patients, the relative intolerance and sensitivity to milk and alcohol should be kept in mind. We discourage our fellow Chinese from overuse of highly salted foods and seasoning since we have learned that some of the diseases among our fellow Chinese is related to dietary habits.

It was our honor to have Dr. March Fong Eu, the Secretary of State of California and Councilman Lily Chen, the Mayer of the city of Monterey Park joining us in the conference dinner. Their presence was the highlight of the evening. Dr. Thomas E. Malone, Chairperson, Task Force on Black and Minority Health, U.S. Department of Health and Human Service sent his representative Dr. Katrina W. Johnson, Study Director for the Task Force to participate in the various activities in this conference suggesting that our hard work for the Conference on Health Problems Related to the Chinese in America have been recognized at the federal level.

I must thank my wife for her invaluable support allowing me to spend the time necessary to prepare for this conference. Many thanks to my colleagues for the assistance which made this conference possible. The First and Second Conferences have become history. Your participation today has given us a guarantee of success for future conferences.



On behalf of the Chinese American Medical Society, I would like to welcome you to the Third Conference on Health Problems Related to the Chinese in America. As our predecessors have envisioned, the Conference is to serve as a forum for sharing information among investigators and practitioners of diverse background but having in common an interest in cross-culture approach in health care delivery, in the study of hereditary versus environmental effects on pathogenesis of diseases and in the treatment of diseases prevalent among the Chinese in America.

There are several stumbling blocks in health care delivery to the Chinese Americans. Helping a Chinese immigrant family to adopt the American healthcare delivery system may require social and philosophical considerations. The concept of preventive medicine need to be instigated. Availability of clinics, social services and welfare facilities need to be made well known. To seek out the proper physician among the plethora of specialists may need direction. It is empirical for physicians tending the Chinese American communities to have an efficient system to achieve this orientation.

The presence of specific problems of the Chinese Americans stages an opportunity for epidemiological studies on which we should capitalize.

A concerted effort should be made to further our understanding of Chinese medicine widely available in the Chinese community in this country. Further, the therapeutic potentials and untoward side effects of these medications should be made aware to all physicians. Lastly, treatment regimen of common disorders among Chinese are of personal concern to all Chinese Americans and should be thoroughly explored.

It is my sincere wish that the Third Conference will be a step forward toward these goals. I trust that, under the able leadership of Dr. H.H. Wang, this Conference will be a memorable experience for all of us fortunate enough to be a participant.



We of the National Steering Committee organizations, Norman Chang, PhD, David Chiu, MD, Desmond Fung, MD, Winchell Quock, MD, Ronald Szeto, MD, and Paul Tam, MD are particularly elated that the Fourth Conference has been so well-prepared, following upon the first three conferences. Since our initial conference in 1982, held here in San Francisco, we have made a complete circuit, to Los Angeles in 1984, and to New York City in 1986. 

Summary of the 7th Conference:

The Inauguration of FCMS took place in New York City at the 7th Conference, a crowning achievement for CAMS which had for years championed the concept for such an encompassing continental organization and whose leadership gave much impetus to the development of the Federation.

The 7th Conference covered plenary sessions and symposia in GI and GU Problems, transcultural medicine/end result of treatment, ophthalmological problems, neuropsychiatric disorders, respiratory disorders and alternative medicine. Moon Chen, Ph.D. was the keynote speaker. A poster session with over 20 posters was attended by many participants. The Conference concluded with the Quen Sau-Nam Memorial Lecture, given by Peter P.T. Pang, Ph.D., Chairman of Physiology, University of Alberta, on "Recent Advances on the Understanding of the Causes and Therapy of Essential Hypertension", an extraordinarily innovative and provocative lecture, which brought the house down.

The Tenth Conference on Health Problems Related to the Chinese in North America was a resounding success. The Tenth Conference, held June 30-July 1, 2000 at the beautiful Renaissance Parc 55 Hotel in San Francisco, was attended by physicians and health care providers from all over the United States, Canada, and Hong Kong. The Conference was presented by the Federation of Chinese American and Chinese Canadian Medical Societies and organized by the Association of Chinese Community Physicians, Chinese Community Health Care Association, and Chinese Hospital Medical Staff in San Francisco, and the Chinese American Physicians Society, East Bay in Oakland. Over 250 enthusiastic participants gathered to learn about the latest developments in the care of Chinese patients, especially the latest updates in Traditional Chinese Medicine and Chinese Women's Health, during the two-day conference.

The first keynote address was given by *Dr. Margaret Chan*, Director of Health, Department of Public Health in Hong Kong. Dr. Chan spoke about the Integration of Western and Traditional Chinese Medicine- the Hong Kong Experience and an International Perspective. The second keynote speaker was *Dr. Ka Kit Hui*, Professor of Medicine, University of California, Los Angeles School of Medicine and Director of the UCLA Center for East-West Medicine, who spoke on Traditional Chinese Medicine- Basic Concept, Clinical Indications, and Scientific Basis. Dr. Hui also presented the Chinese Hospital Annual Award Lecture, Integrating the Best of Chinese and Western Medicine- A new Paradigm for Health Promotion and Patient Care. These lectures represented three of the many highlights of the Tenth Conference which included a total of 8 plenary lectures, 15 breakout panels covering 54 topics, and 24 abstract presentations. Other topics included various important Women's Health Issues in Asian Women, Cancer in the Chinese population, Rheumatologic Diseasess, Atherosclerosis, Alzheimers' Disease, Cultural Competency, Ocular Diseases, Psychosocial Issues, Pediatric Issues, Erectile Dysfunction, and Chinese Parenting.

There were also luncheon presentations on "Feng Shui and Health" and "Mandate for the Millennium", a presentation by Ms. Shamina Singh, Executive Director of the White House Initiative on Asian American and Pacific Islanders. The Tenth Conference concluded with the Quan Sau Nam Memorial Lecture, Cancer of the Colon and Rectum, by Dr. Stuart Quan from the Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center in New York. It was announced that the Eleventh Conference will be held in New York during the Memorial Day Weekend, 2002.

The Tenth Conference Banquet was held at the Golden Mountain Restaurant on the evening of June 30, and a grand time was had by all. Dr. Ka Kit Hui was the main guest of honor as he received the Twenty-seventh Chinese Hospital Annual Award. Outgoing Federation Officers were acknowledged and incoming Federation Officers were installed during the evening festivities. Special congratulations to Dr. Hsueh hwa Wang from New York, the new FCMS President, and Dr. Collin Quock, the new Chairman of the Board of FCMS. In addition, Year 2000 Outstanding Achievement Awards were presented to Dr. Gregory Fung, Chairman of the Conference Committee, Dr. Kenneth Chan, Scientific Program Committee Chair, and Dr. Gordon Fung, Finance Committee Chair.

We hope that the Tenth Conference has accomplished its objective of providing a forum for sharing essential clinical information to help meet the special health care needs of the Chinese community. We also hope that the Conference provided an opportunity for all of us to meet new friends and renew old acquaintances. Many thanks to the sponsoring organization, committee members, staff, and volunteers who helped make this conference a great success. Finally, good luck to our colleagues in New York as they prepare for the Eleventh Conference in 2002 and continue the proud tradition of our conference into the next millennium!
